**Teen Mentoring:**

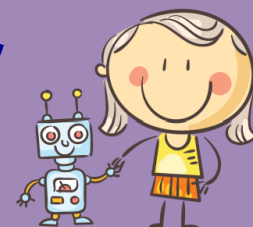
This program matches a High School student with a child in Grades 1 – 6. The matches participate virtually in planned activities such as crafts, challenges, trivia games, experiments, and much more!

## **Six Essential Things to Do with Children Each Day**

**Create** – anything that allows for the freedom to use their imagination

**Move** – an hour of active play

**Sing** – singing builds language and allows joy to flow

**Discuss** – communication skills are essential for school success

**Read** – read, read, and read until you think your lips will fall off

**Play** – playing is the cement that holds families together

### **Play-dough**

2 cups flour  
½ cup salt  
1 tbsp cream of tartar  
1 ¼ cups boiling water  
2 tbsp oil  
food coloring or unsweetened Koolaid

Mix all dry ingredients together. Add oil and coloring. Stir in boiling water but let cool slightly before kneading.

For scented playdough, add spices like cinnamon, cloves, ginger, cocoa powder, etc.

**WONDERING ABOUT YOUR CHILD'S DEVELOPMENT?**

The Ages and Stages Questionnaire can give you a guideline to tell if your child is doing what other children of the same age are typically doing.

**Ages 2 months to 60 months**

**Why is it important for my child to be screened?**

Regular screening provides a fast and helpful look at how your child is doing in important areas like communication, social skills, and problem-solving skills. Screening can identify your child's strength, uncover new milestones to celebrate, and reveal any areas where your child may need support. It helps you understand your child's development and know what to look for next when it makes the most difference – your child's critical first years of life.

# PROCESSING LIVED EXPERIENCES THROUGH JOURNALING



Journaling, as a form of expressive writing, is one of the most widely used and highly effective tools for self growth and self help.

## Benefits of Journaling

1. Fosters a sense of gratitude, optimism, peace, and hopefulness.
2. Boost's immunity, lowers blood pressure, improves connection with others, and enhances cognitive abilities by helping process our lived experiences more fully.
3. Helps to better understand others, grow capacity for empathy, and thereby enhances the quality of our relationships.
4. Learn more about who we are, our values, beliefs, strengths, limitations, intentions, perceptions, and aspirations.
5. Can also be cathartic by silencing the demands and distractions of everyday life.

## Two categories of Journaling – Ongoing and Specific/event focused.

Either way, the purpose and benefits are similar. Sometimes people keep more than one journal, each with a unique purpose and focus. Examples of journal types include: Daily reflection, autobiographical, gratitude, forgiveness, grief and loss, goal setting, expressive art (poetry/drawing), mindfulness, or treatment focused (such as for anxiety or depression)

## Essential rules when journaling

Write like no one else is reading! Beyond that, it is important to recognize that there is no right or wrong way to write or express ourselves. Pick up a paper and pen or your laptop and start writing about whatever comes to mind, even something small like what you had to eat today. Given that journaling is expressive, be creative! Your expressions can take the form of a poem, song, letter, or drawing. You can also use different colours to highlight things that stand out in your entries, such as themes, patterns, ideas, goals, new insights, inspirations, or affirmations.

## A few cautionary notes about journaling

- 1) **Avoid spending too much time in your head.** Try to focus on the connection between what you think, what you feel, and what you do.
- 2) **Try to stay in the present moment as much as possible,** focusing on the here and now.
- 3) **Try to steer away from blame** as it undermines the true catalysts for personal growth, which are acceptance, regard, love, and compassion, of both self and of others.

## The following products may not be accepted for recycling:

- Grass and leaves are bagged. Please do **NOT** pile them loose in your alley.
- Material should be neatly stacked and **SEPARATE** from your regular weekly garbage pick-up.
- We **will not enter private property** to collect – alley line is private property line, curb for front pick-up.
- Please be sure that **objects you do not want disposed of** are not in your alley or collection area.

*Items should be put out no earlier  
than 1 week before clean-up and not  
impede roadways, sidewalks, alleys*

*Please place TV's, Bikes, Appliances  
and Metals in separate piles in pick

## Branch Chipping Please follow these guidelines

- ... Do not include branches with roots, dirt, leaves, metal or other refuse.
- ... Pile branches so as not to obstruct pick up
- ... Branches should be stacked in one direction and piled as neatly as possible.

## UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS (THE FOLLOWING ITEMS WILL **NOT** BE COLLECTED)

- NO** construction or renovation material
- NO** concrete, lumber, roofing shingles, siding material
- NO** dirt or piles of sod
- NO** paint, solvents, oils, antifreeze
- NO** car parts or car bodies
- NO** refrigerators, freezers or air conditioner units
